Marshall's Musings

We are only three weeks into the new liturgical year and like many other years, I have already heard many comments of "how quickly Christmas came and went" and "how soon Lent would be upon us!" But did you hear that Christmas music on Christmas Eve, Midnight Mass, Christmas Day, Holy Family, Mary, Mother of God, Epiphany and Baptism of the Lord? It's not easy, but it is fun to get "ALL" of that Christmas music into such a short time!

The common conception of Epiphany is that of the three kings, who, following the star, brought gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh to the Christ Child in Bethlehem. Their hopes were more fulfilled than they expected. They saw the savior and fell down in worship. They teach us that we should offer our best to God. Epiphany is a threefold event: the Epiphany to the three Kings, the Epiphany at the Baptism of the Lord and finally the Epiphany at the first miracle of the Lord at Cana, in Galilee.

The celebration of the Baptism of the Lord ended the Christmas season. Last week we began the weeks of Ordinary time which has the gospel of the third Epiphany- the miracle of the Lord at the wedding at Cana, setting the foundation for these weeks of Ordinary time before Lent.

Ordinary time, before Lent, calls us to live out the grace of our baptism as more loving and faithful disciples of the Lord. WE are called to look within our hearts in an honest examination of conscience to see how we are doing and deepen our commitment to Jesus Christ as lord and Savior.

Now, let's look at today's gospel from Luke which has Jesus' first act of public ministry. Following His river baptism, Jesus returns to his home country, Galilee. Reports about him have been spreading through the population, probably the result of his healing miracles. So when he comes back home, it's quite a big day in the synagogue. Everybody's there, eager to hear the local boy who's making a name for himself.

Jesus enters the synagogue on that Sabbath morning. It seems smaller than it looked to him as a child, but otherwise nothing about this familiar place had changed. Joseph and Mary prepared him well for life. They raised him faithfully in their religion.

So Jesus returns to the Nazareth synagogue, thankful for the upbringing he received there. He asked to read the lessons from the prophets, but there is

no lectionary to get the reading from, so the choice is up to him. There is no book to flip through. Instead, a bulky scroll is brought to him and placed upon the lectern. Jesus, searching for a familiar text, unrolls it to a place near the end of the scroll. In his strong voice he reads these words: "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor,"

Then Jesus sits down. All of the people are looking at him. They are trying to understand what he said. Jesus sets free the scripture passage he has just read; let's say that he has let the lion out of the cage. He claims these ancient prophetic words as his own personal mission statement. The reason God came crashing down on him at his baptism was to empower him to do precisely this: bring good news to the poor, release the captives and recovery of sight to the blind; let all the oppressed go free; and to announce that God's justice will reshape society.

Jesus takes all of this as his mission statement and he is not content to leave it as a string of high sounding words. Everything that follows in his life, as we heard in the gospel, accounts to the living out of the prophecy he claims for himself that Saturday morning. He keeps doing these things every time he turns around, until finally, it kills him! Some people welcome what Jesus does, but others did not because it upsets their unfair advantage.

Jesus strives to live out his mission statement. Jesus still does these things because the church is doing them. When Jesus reads that passage in the Nazareth synagogue, he announces a mission statement for himself and for his body, the church.

"Today, this prophecy has come to fulfillment in your hearing."

Thus, we have the beginning of Jesus' role as teacher, Lord and Savior!

This Jubilee Year offers some special opportunities to gain plenary indulgences by visiting pilgrimage sites designated by the Bishop. Take a minute to read the Bishop's Decree to learn more!

DECREE

Jesus Christ is the source of hope. In the fullness of God's unlimited mercy, our Holy Father Pope Francis has declared a Jubilee Year 2025– *Pilgrims of Hope*. We are now called to become *Pilgrims of Hope* encouraged to be deeply attentive of God's endless mercy and forgiveness.

This spiritual gift of this Holy Year will begin with the opening of the Holy Door of the Basilica of St Peter's on Christmas Eve, December 24, 2024.

This Jubilee officially opens within the Diocese of Green Bay on January 6, 2025 at St. Francis Xavier Cathedral in Green Bay, Wisconsin.

The Jubilee Year will formally conclude on the Solemnity of Epiphany of the Lord on January 6, 2026.

With the guidance of the letter from his Holiness Pope Francis of May 13, 2024, according to which an indulgence is granted to the faithful on the occasion of this Jubilee Year of Hope, I designate the following as sacred places of pilgrimage in the Diocese of Green Bay:

St. Francis Xavier Cathedral - Green Bay, Wisconsin

The Shrine of Our Lady of Champion - Champion, Wisconsin

St. Pius X Parish- Appleton, Wisconsin

Thus, a plenary indulgence might be obtained by devoutly visiting any of the Jubilee pilgrimage sites listed in this Decree.

An indulgence is a powerful gift to the souls of believers. Indulgences aid in healing the brokenness caused by our sins in this world and reduce or completely eliminate the temporal punishment due to our sins. Indulgences are either partial or plenary (complete). Indulgences may be obtained for oneself or for the souls of the deceased. One plenary indulgence may be received each day. To obtain a plenary indulgence, those members of the faithful who are truly repentant of their sins and moved by a spirit of mercy are to:

- > Visit one of the designated churches or shrines. Alternatively, the sick, homebound or incarcerated may follow the instructions listed above. Alternatively, any member of the faithful may perform a spiritual or corporal work of mercy.
- Receive the Sacrament of Penance by going to Confession.
- Receive the Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist.
- > Be truly free from all willful attachment to sin.
- Make a Profession of Faith. (Recite the Nicene or Apostles Creed)
- > Pray for Pope Francis' intentions for the Church and for the world. (Recite the Our Father)

The Sacrament of Penance and the Sacrament of the Eucharist may be received several days before or after performing the prescribed act.

Additionally, for those who cannot participate in the various solemn celebrations, pilgrimages, and pious visits for serious reasons (especially cloistered nuns and monks, elderly, the sick, and prisoners) by living their lives with faith and joyful hope in the midst of their trials and by receiving holy communion or attending mass, if necessary, through various forms of media. For those who are incarcerated, they may receive the indulgence by praying in their prison chapels.

Furthermore, since the experience of hope becomes visible in the witness of concrete signs as Jesus Himself taught us, for those members of the faithful who perform any of the spiritual or corporal works of mercy, these too shall surely obtain the jubilee indulgence.

As Christians hope will not disappoint as it is grounded securely in God's abiding Love. May this Jubilee be a time of renewed hope that awakens in hearts the hope of salvation in Christ.




